

It has been brought to our attention that a number of electrical lines are rather precariously run from the service pedestals to boats. Please check your electrical lines and ensure that they do not constitute a trip hazard and are not in contact with the water.

The Tuesday Working Group has continued their excellent work maintaining our marina – deck flipping and underdeck maintenance works are underway on A Finger. Once completed, the entire length of the deck on A Finger will have been replaced or flipped and preserved.

A reminder please, if you see something needs attention on the marina, please complete the form located in the Marina Maintenance Folder next to the entrance to the Kinnear Room. This is the fastest and most reliable way of getting mooring lines, lights and other minor maintenance issues addressed.

THE MARINA HINDMARSH ISLAND GOOLWA REGATTA WEEK



Day One - Marina Challenge

The Marina Hindmarsh Island Goolwa Regatta Week got underway on Saturday 14th January 2017 at The Marina Hindmarsh Island with the Marina Challenge, a unique and exciting time-trial yacht race in Barker, Sturt, Strangways and Hutchinson Lagoons sponsored by The Marina Hindmarsh Island and Club Marine Insurance.

Now in its sixth year, the format involved two runs through the lagoons with boats started at two minute intervals, and the fastest boats getting underway first.

Due to the nature of the confined start line, the black flag rule was in place, meaning any boat that crossed the line early would be recorded as disqualified for that run.

With the wind a fresh 17-21 knots from the sou' west, there was enough wind to get boats moving and maintain momentum in the lulls behind houses.

Residents lining the race course were again out in force to provide encouragement to the yachts as they raced by. All the race competitors agreed there were even more house parties than in previous years. Marina residents were treated with box seats as boats sailed within metres of their front lawns.

Timing the start right proved a bit tricky for some of the entrants, with a number of boats making dramatic manoeuvres metres from the start line as they attempted to avoid the disqualification that came with an untimely start. Many learnt from previous years the importance of getting a good start and all boats successfully started and completed the first time trial. With one run under their belts, boats were now familiar with the course and readied themselves for a tighter and cleaner run the second time around. With the wind having shifted more to the east, the crews and

skippers had to work harder to keep the yachts moving into the breeze. Some yachts resorted to tacking.

At the conclusion of the second run, boats moored up in front of The Landing where race post mortems were held as delicious refreshments were served.


The Marina Hindmarsh Island has established a Marina Challenge Perpetual Trophy for the event that will remain on display at The Landing.

Results were read from last to first heightening the atmosphere as the announcement of place getters drew near. So in that tradition:

In 3rd place: Elanora (RL28) skippered by Louise Edwards.

In 2nd place: *Endeavour* (Restricted 21) skippered by Lyndon Bartlett.

In 1st place: Dolphin (Restricted 21) skippered by Chris Reiffel.



Day Two - Expo Gala

On Sunday 15th January, the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club was abuzz with the sights, sounds and smells of the best that Goolwa has to offer. The lawns in front of the club were filled with stalls as local businesses and community groups displayed their wares and offered visitors the chance to discover more about their work.

There was plenty to keep visitors sustained with strawberries and cream, international cuisine, wood fired pizzas, freshly brewed coffee, BBQ and more!

On the water Sailability conducted four short races each of 10 minutes duration. This regatta was for the Simon Thiele Trophy in honour of our Past Commodore and founding member of Sailability at the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club. Ten boats competed displaying their colourful sails and showing what

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Sailability stands for. Crews and skippers enjoyed close racing with a sausage course and southerly winds of approximately 10 knots.

The Goolwa Vintage Boat Club participated in the GRYC TMHI Regatta Week with a sailing event which attracted 12 competitors. The course consisted of two laps of the Goolwa Pond in fresh southerly conditions. With a combined age of many hundred years, the Vintage River Boat fleet keeps alive an important part of Goolwa's nautical traditions and embodies generations of river history and folklore. The graceful lines, gleaming bright paint work, white sails and colourful flags caught the eyes of spectators who lined the river to take in the event.



A great competitive start saw *Mandalay* win the start followed by *Edith* and *Ellen*. At the top mark *Dolphin* had taken the lead followed by *Endeavour* and then *Ellen*.

Line honours went to *Dolphin* with *Endeavour* in second place and *Ellen* in third.

Handicap results saw *Mandalay* take first place, *Iole* in second place and *Zeta* finished third.

The weather could not have been better, with blue skies and a breeze of 10 to 15 knots from the South, the public took advantage of the conditions and to enjoy a perfect day in Goolwa. From the Steamranger and market at the main wharf, along the foreshore to the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club and then further along to the Goolwa Aquatic Club, people were everywhere.

Inside the Kinnear Room scale model yachts were on display along with an art exhibition by talented local photographer Chris Caffin.



Day Three - Radio ContrOlled Yacht Regatta

Another beautiful day in Goolwa on Monday greeted entrants in the 2017 The Marina Hindmarsh Island Goolwa Regatta Week Radio Controlled Yacht Regatta sponsored by Helga Campbell.

With the start scheduled for 1400 hrs, the car park and lawn area adjacent the ramp were filled with a variety of radio controlled yachts and their skippers as they rigged, tuned and prepared for the afternoon's races.

Fourteen yachts in two divisions entered the regatta. Four classes of yacht were represented across the two divisions, with Division 2 comprising the 1m class and Division 1 comprising Phantoms, a Hurricane and Marble Heads.

Principal Race Officer Philip Booth said the turnout was excellent with ideal conditions and enough wind to keep all the yachts moving.

The racing got underway with light south westerlies and, with a beautiful sunny 33 degrees, the conditions were perfect for racers

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and spectators alike and many people came down to watch the regatta. As the regatta progressed the wind remained variable allowing each division to complete 8 races.

Handicap starts were controlled by a computer program, using a count-up system for the start that was broadcast via a small speaker, clear and easy for all to hear, including spectators.

The start and finish line were between two marina posts and the course set started with a tight reach to a buoy set near Galpin Reserve followed by a beat to a buoy on the eastern side of the 'pond' where boats tacked and headed downwind to the leeward buoys near the main marina walkway before the final short leg to the finish line.

The Racing Rules of Sailing apply to radio controlled yachts and the competitive spirit and friendly rivalry of all sailors was evident on the day with quite a few calls of 'obstruction' as boats worked hard to gain an advantage.

The presentation in the GRYC club rooms completed a great day and prizes were presented by the Commodore Lyn Roberts. The club provided tasty light refreshments while skippers talked over the races. All competitors agreed they had a very enjoyable afternoon.

Day Five - Maughan Thiem Tune Up Race

In its third year, the Maughan Thiem Tune Up Race provides skippers of yachts with a CBH (Class Based Handicap) of less than .740 the opportunity to test their boat in racing conditions before the big event – The Marina Hidmarsh Island Milang-Goolwa Freshwater Classic.

The course for the event mirrors that of the Dash for Cash, comprising a windward leeward windward leeward course.

This year all entrants raced in two back-to-back races with the winner being determined by the lowest aggregate time across the two races on corrected time.

With a \$250 cash prize and perpetual trophy on offer for first place there was plenty of pressure on skippers and crew.

The forecast for the day included thunderstorms, lightning and considerable rain and wind, but by the time sailors arrived at the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club to prepare their boats, there was

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barely a cloud in the sky and a nice 15 or so knots from the east.

All nine entrants got away nicely in both races and there was quite a bit of congestion at the first (leeward) mark where yachts hardened up and headed a short distance to the offset buoy before a close hauled leg to the second buoy set near the bridge. From there it was back to the leeward buoy and then to the finish line.

The results were very close with just 2 seconds separating 1st from 2nd and 3rd from 4th! After the corrected results for both races were combined, the place getters were: 3rd - Farr 'n' Fast, L McLaren; 2nd - Destiny, T Baldock; 1st - Cat-el, P White.

Day Six - Kies Home Timber and Hardware Dash for Cash

The Kies Home Hardware and Timber Dash for Cash is a fixture of the Goolwa Regatta Week and for decades the race has been held on the Friday before the Milang-Goolwa Freshwater Classic, providing skippers of yachts with a CBH (Class Based Handicap) equal to or greater than .740 the opportunity to test their boat in racing conditions before the big event – the TMHI Milang-Goolwa Freshwater Classic.

The format for the event comprises two heats of a windward leeward windward leeward course with the top four yachts (on corrected) from each heat going through to the final. With a \$750 winner takes

all cash prize, there was plenty of pressure on skippers and crew.

With 15-18 knots from the South, the event was lining up to be fast with spectacular spinnaker sets, runs and drops. This year's guest commentator, past Commodore Graham "Robbo" Roberts, ensured the spectators who packed the yacht club marina knew exactly what was going on and why.


Heat one boats (BOHICA, Nerana, Endeavour, Maniac and Seabomb) quickly got out on the water and did some practice runs to see how well their kites would set on the downwind legs before heading to the starting area. Heat two boats (The Shed, Hammer, Dolphin, Karnagree and Wet Spot) followed 5 minutes later.

Both starts were keenly contested and got away cleanly but not before *The Shed* and *Maniac* put in penalty turns for breaches on the start line in their heat. As yachts tacked within metres of the GRYC Marina, spectators were treated to fabulous viewing.

Going through to the final was *Dolphin*, *Nerana*, *Endeavour*, *BOHICA*, *Seabomb*, *Hammer* and *The Shed*. All boats sailed excellent races with tight tacking, smooth gybes and solid kite sets.

In first place by a significant margin of 1 minute and 4 seconds on corrected and collecting the winner takes all \$750 cash prize was *Nerana*, skippered by Randal Cooper.





The Marina Hindmarsh Island 2017 Milang - Goolwa

It was a busy morning at Milang as around 1000 sailors prepared themselves for the 2017 The Marina Hindmarsh Island Milang-Goolwa Freshwater Classic on Sunday 22nd January. The fleet of trailable yachts, large multi-hulls and off-the-beach catamarans and dinghies made for a majestic sight for the thousands of spectators who lined the course, both on land and on water, from Pt Sturt all the way to Goolwa.

The course took entrants across Lake Alexandrina, passing through a gate midway between Milang and Pt Sturt, then another gate between Beacon 88 and Point Sturt, along the River Murray, past Clayton and under the Hindmarsh Island Bridge to the finish line in front of the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club.

The origin of the Milang-Goolwa dates back to 1966 when *Edith* and *Esther*, wooden river boats, raced from Goolwa to Milang to establish which boat was fastest. Fifty years later, *Edith* was amongst the fleet of 11 Vintage Wooden Boats to enter the Milang-Goolwa and continue the tradition of being the first division to start the race.

There was a large contingent of off-the-beach boats and many were grateful for the reassurance, support and assistance of the Victor Harbor and Goolwa Sea Rescue who provided a professional and superb effort on the day.

The race formally concluded back at the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club, where the official presentations took place. Lyn Roberts, Commodore of the GRYC, in welcoming competitors and guests thanked the sponsors for their continuing support and noted that, "No other freshwater yacht race brings competitors and spectators together the way this classic yacht race does. I want to thank the hardworking team of volunteers who have made this event such a success."

The WR Appleby Trophy for the first boat on corrected in Division 1 went to *Janillian*, skippered by John Dickson.

The AB Kinnear Perpetual Trophy went to *Elanora* (Div 2) skippered by Louise Edwards and *Neopthyte* (Div 3) skippered by Derek Morrison.

The Commodore's Trophy went to *Bacchus* (Div 4) skippered by Brendan Murray and *Free* (Div 5) skippered by Trevor Hamlyn.

The Remilton Trophy went to Wilparina III skippered by Rob Remilton.

Dolphin, skippered by Chris Reiffel, took out the Keith Veenstra Memorial Trophy for the fastest Restricted 21 and the Blue Darling trophy for the fastest trailable yacht in divisions 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6.

The Crowhurst Trophy for the first boat in Division 2 to pass through the gate at Pt Sturt went to *Seabomb* skippered by Harry Cooper.

Cock of the Lake for the fastest time in all divisions went to *Raketvapen* skippered by Marcus Towell.



Steeplejack's last Port Lincoln Regatta.

It took a week to strip all the gear out of *Steeplejack*. This included flooring, the works, based on the idea to reduce weight for the Port Lincoln Regatta.

The boat spent two days at Pelican Marine Repairs where all the rigging, turning blocks, rudder and keel were inspected and polished (serious stuff). Overall we scored 5th, 1 point behind a Northshore 38, and 1.5 points behind a Sydney 32 which came in 3rd overall. We were more than happy with our effort. Tying Up to Reeds

Rob England

From time to time some people have run into trouble tying up to reeds! A simple, fail safe method, is

- **I.** Grab a big bundle of reeds as much as you can get both hands around when it is compressed together, and make sure there is plenty of green growth in the bundle.
- **2.** Tie the mooring line securely about the clump of reeds.
- the clump of reeds.

 3. Fold the bundle over about 150mm
 (6") above the tie, and then take the long tail of the mooring line, and tie the folded over reeds to the already tied bundle, but make sure that the second tie is below the first tie. Then tie the tail of the rope back to the mooring line. If there is sufficient rope, repeat with two or three more bundles of reeds and you will still be there in the morning.
