#### **2021 Annual General Meeting Report**

The club's annual general meeting (AGM) is an important element of the club's governance. It provides members with the opportunity to review the last season's operations, the club's financial position, and to query the General Committee on its activities, and discuss future plans.

It is also the occasion for members to appoint the Flag Officers and other General Committee members for the coming season.

At this year's meeting, which was held on Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> of June, the Commodore, Vice Commodore and the Treasurer each presented their reports to members.

The Commodore, Randal Cooper, observed in his report that it had been a challenge to conduct the past season of events. COVID check-ins, updating our procedures each time the regulations change, and assessing and re-assessing the scale of each event had certainly made the General Committee think carefully about how we manage operations at the GRYC.

The Vice Commodore, Trevor Baldock, provided a comprehensive report on the Summer Season recently concluded. Trevor noted that the Club had been able to deliver the vast majority of the Summer Season notwithstanding the ever-present threat of shutdowns and restrictions.

The Treasurer, Alex Woods, delivered his Financial Report for the year ended 31 March 2021. Government relief grants successfully covered the loss of trading though the closedowns and restrictions of autumn and winter 2020. In light of the uncertainty hanging over the entire year, the General Committee kept a tight rein on expenditures. Overall, the club achieved a strong profit result, ensuring the Club remains in a sound financial position.

All General Committee positions are vacated at the AGM.

Three members of the general committee stepped down at the AGM – Trevor Baldock, Ben Sanders and Jeff Secomb. They were thanked for their contributions to the club.

Nominations for the incoming General Committee matched the available positions and no voting process was therefore required.

All nominated persons were appointed to the General Committee.



#### **GRYC SheSails**

The Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club's commitment to encouraging and supporting women into sailing continues to grow as it launches its first ever annual Women's Sailing Program for the 2021/22 Season.

While there is a long history of women sailors at the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club, including an all-women's team who entered the Milang-Goolwa Freshwater Classic back in the 1980s, the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club recognises the need to provide a renewed focus and opportunities for women to become involved in the sport of sailing.

In 2018 it set aside a race in the Winter Series as a dedicated Women's Helm race and created coaching and practice sessions to ensure participants would have the experience to participate. From a single race for the next 3 seasons, the Women's Sailing Program has continued to grow, including a Women's Twilight Series which was introduced in 2020.



In 2021/22 the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club formalised its support of the initiative and created the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club's SheSails Committee to oversee and progress the Women's Sailing Program. SheSails is a national scheme established under the umbrella of the National Sailing body: Australian Sailing.

Building on the success of the Women's Helm Races, on water practice and coaching, informal training sessions and Women's Twilight Series, the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club's SheSails Committee has established a comprehensive program for the 2021/22 season which encompasses over 20 events including:

- a dedicated twilight series where the helm and 50% of the crew must be women
- formal and informal training courses
- midweek cruises
- a coaching clinic
- dinghy practice sessions
- overnight Coorong cruise
- networking and interclub visits

The program has been designed to provide variety with a view that people will register for the events in which they are interested. Most are free of charge and suitable to all skill and interest levels. The program is primarily focussed on women, along with their supporters. All women members, their friends and family with an interest in getting out on the water are encouraged to join in.

It would not be possible to run this program without the fabulous support from all our volunteers, members and advocates and we welcome their active participation in the program.

#### **How to Travel Through a Lock**

There are five simple rules for travelling through a lock.

- 1. Contact the lock attendant before you approach.

  Once your vessel is positioned around 400-600 metres from the lock, you can use any of these methods to let the attendant know you want to travel through:
  - three prolonged blasts (four seconds each) on a whistle, air or electric horn or other suitable device
  - via a mobile phone.
- 2. Wait until you see a red flashing light on top of the control boxes. This means the lock attendant has acknowledged your request and they are preparing the lock for you.
- 3. Do not approach until you are told to.


  Keep more than 150 metres back from the lock until you see a green flashing light. This is the signal for you to proceed into the lock chamber in a safe and controlled manner.
- 4. Stop in the lock chamber where the lock attendant tells you to stop. They will pass down ropes so you can secure your vessel. Wrap not tie the rope around an appropriate fixing point, ensuring it remains secure.
- 5. Navigating the lock with a vessel tied to the side of a houseboat is not recommended. For your safety, you also need to remain onboard during the lockage process.

#### **Events in SA and Australia.**

One Metre events have continued in SA with the state championship being run earlier this year. We had a couple of entrants, Randy Elkson and Peter Mitchell, who did not disgrace themselves!

There is still planned to be an Australian championship held in Adelaide later in November – COVID willing.

Quite a few spectators have asked where do you get a One Metre? There are manufacturers worldwide who specialise in this with one of the top designs made in NZ. These are not cheap (you can probably pick up an old Trailerable for less).

There is a second-hand market and that's where our members have mostly obtained their vessels. A quick search for a 'For Sale' on the web should find them. Alternatively, our web site at www.scoastmac.org.au has a 'For Sale' page though I'm not sure if there are any listed currently.

Some sailors have built their own One Metre. There are plenty of designs available which can be moulded in balsa, timber or fiberglass if you have the skills. Some clubs have a mould that can be used.

Bear in mind that to be competitive, a yacht must be at minimum weight (4 Kg) and not much more. As the max fin weight is fixed (2.5Kg) and a rig (mast and sails) weighs about 330g, that leaves  $\sim \! 1170g$  for the hull and all its works. A well-built yacht will achieve this easily and still have 250g or more of ballast to achieve the 4 Kg minimum.



The hull and deck are almost ready for joining after a bit more work on a keel box.

There are a couple of outlets in Australia specialising in the supply of all things radio yachts, fittings electrics etc.

Jade was appointed Club Manager in 2018 and in her words 'working as Manager at GRYC has given me the rare opportunity to combine my love of sailing with my 10+ years' experience in the hotel and hospitality industry'.

These last few years have not always been easy as substantial changes have been made to how the club operates. For example; introduction of a new accounting software and Jade absorbing the duties of a previous part-time bookkeeper, a vast change to food service for various events and the ever-challenging restrictions and requirements.

As the Club's only permanent employee, Jade works with and relies upon the Volunteers that contribute at all levels to the Club's success – from the highly visible role of Commodore through to the mostly unseen helpers such as the Tuesday Working Group.

She observed in a recent interview with Southern Argus newspaper that working at GRYC has been her first role in a volunteer-based organisation. Many of the Volunteers not only give their time to GRYC but to other organisations like Rotary or Wildlife Rescue. Her customer focussed hospitality experience combined with excellent administrative skills and a 'can do' attitude are wonderful assets for the club.





#### **Bremerton Wines Dauntlus Cup 2021**

The 2021 Dauntless Cup was held on Saturday 27th August. The course started just upstream of the Hindmarsh Island bridge and required boats to sail upstream past Clayton and around Rat Island before returning to finish in front of the Club.

Once again, this race served up a variety of conditions, and what we all thought was going to be a nice easy day with sunshine, beer and a reach both ways instead became a hard slog near Clayton when the wind went to the west and hit 25 knots.

Crews found themselves working far too hard on the return leg downstream towards Goolwa.

The 92 year-old vintage river boat *Wylo* (Randal Cooper) led the non-spinnaker fleet from the start, cutting every corner through the shallows to win line honours and on corrected time. The old tub loved the big breeze and powered along the course.

It wasn't until after the race that we found out Farr 6000 *Mackie* (Justin Stanbridge) had broken their keel cable and sailed the whole race with it swinging at full depth.

RL28 *Girlfriend* (Peter Briton-Jones) was looking like a winner until the wind increased and the hard tacking started.

The spinnaker fleet all had their pretty sails out of their bags and colourful spinnakers were everywhere, some sideways and some under the water.

The VX1 7 Meals (Chris McPhee), the 18ft skiff Magic Box (Alex Blacker) and the Sharpie Tripper Snipper (Ben Kesley) all had a ball with them fairly close to the rounding mark upstream of Rat Island.

On the way downstream the VX1 pulled away to be first over the line in Division 3 in a little over three hours elapsed time, and also took out the division on corrected time.

*Tripper Snipper,* the sole Sharpie in the fleet, was 4 minutes faster than the VX1, alas with no-one else in its division.

Behind the front runners, the two Noelex 25s *Destiny* (Trevor Baldock) and *Foxy* (Derek Morrison) had a great tussle with two minutes between them at the finish.

And it was good to see the Restricted 21 *Bright'un* out on the water again after Mike Schirmer's epic Cape York adventures.

The catamarans had the closest finish of the day with just four seconds between two Nacra 5.8s, *Animal Scanny* (J Southall) and *Makani* (K McCallum).

These two boats finished less than a minute behind the very quick F16 *Element Sails* (S Hallsworth) and were able to take out first and second on corrected time.

Great racing from these big off the beach cats, and so good to see the young guns giving the old geezers a bit of a push around the course.

Overall, a wonderful day on the water and the hot food back at the club was greatly appreciated by the sailors.

Our event sponsor, Bremerton Wines, are fantastic and we thank them for their continued support of Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club.

This was indicated at the club's annual meeting, when Mr. Bryce Kinnear was appointed Commodore and Mr. Dennis Crowhurst vice-commodore.

The club's next major project will be the construction of a launching ramp, a marina-jetty and a swinging mooring basin.

These facilities would provide the best facilities for trailer sailers in South Australia.

The club's membership list is closed, with 300 members, and a keen waiting list has been established.

The club membership predominantly consists of trailer-sailer families and is the largest trailer-sailer sailing club in the State.

The club welcomes membership applications from trailer-sailer owners wishing to participate in the club's races and cruises.

Trailer-sailer events planned for next season will include the Milang to Goolwa Classic, which attracted more than 200 entries last year, overnight cruise and races to Rat Island, Point Sturt and other destinations

within the Goolwa-Coorong lake system.

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#### **Endeavour**



A photo was recently sent through to GRYC of Restricted 21 "Endeavour" currently owned and skippered by Lyndon Bartlett. The photo was received from Geoff Cook of Queenscliff Lonsdale Yacht Club who was introduced to sailing on the vessel 56 years ago.

Endeavour along with Altair were the later Restricted 21s being designed and constructed by J. J. Savage & Sons in Williamstown, Victoria, was launched in 1947.

Endeavour was built for the Royal St Kilda Yacht Club through a syndicate scheme.

An article and picture were placed in the January *Seacraft* magazine stating: *'Finance was raised by means of 1 Pound shares sold to club members, 170 of whom bought their means and enthusiasm'.* 



I bought *Endeavour* from Jock Veenstra in 1987. It was, at this stage, still in her original condition as she was in 1947, with Beech laid deck and combing and a Kauri centre case. The rig however was not.

*Endeavour* was converted to a Bermuda rig in the late 1960s with no bow sprit and a roller reefed main with a very heavy 12m keel stepped mast.

Although still original she needed a lot of work.

The deck was collapsing, the centre case was not salvageable, being constructed with steel bolts and all the ribs aft of the centre case needed replacing.

The restoration was set to take up to two years. This turned out to be 18 months after receiving an invitation, along with *Dolphin*, from the Albert Park Yacht Club to take part in a Bicentenary Sailing Regatta on Albert Park Lake, in November 1988.

With all restoration projects the planning comes first. I decided to spline glue and encapsulate the hull and deck with epoxy, to not only strengthen the boat but to reduce future maintenance.

First job was the deck's centre case and to remove the broken ribs. After the ribs had been replaced in the traditional method, a new centre case with deck beams and deck was completed.



Endeavour was rolled over to be spline glued, then rolled back upright. She was then ready to sand, fair and epoxy inside and out.

Having a dead line of November 1988 to have *Endeavour* sailing in Melbourne, there was no time for a prelaunch and first sail in Goolwa. It was straight off to Melbourne, along with *Dolphin*, loaded on the back of a semi-trailer. The mast was a hand-medown timber Dragon mast from *Dolphin*. My first sail was an hour before the first race, after still bolting fittings on that morning.



Over the years that I have been lucky enough to own *Endeavour*, she has had three different rigs and many more sails. I have sailed many races at the GRYC and GVBC on the Goolwa waters, as well as returning to Albert Park Lake for the Melbourne Grand Prix, along with numerous trips to Ballarat for the season opening of the Ballarat Yacht Club on Lake Wendouree.

With the coming season upon us, it's time for a clean, anti-foul and polish to be ready for another exciting summer of racing.
