Slow Progress on the Clubhouse Development

Our application for all-weather groundlevel development and bridge enhancement was scheduled for the 20 November meeting of the Development Assessment Panel for development consent and, at the time of writing the outcome of this meeting is unknown. There were six community representations, four favourable and two negative and we have lodged a response to these representations. We are extremely fortunate to have Keith Teagle providing his expertise in the design phase, taking care to minimise local impact.

Alexandrina Council also sought responses from SA Government agencies which were supportive. However, before the proposal was considered by the Development Assessment Panel of Alexandrina Council, we were asked to address some cultural heritage issues.

We have subsequently entered into a Work Area Clearance Agreement with the Ngarrindjeri Heritage Committee (NHC), and agreed to a Cultural Survey of the site. The NHC and the Ngarrindjeri Native Title Management Committee undertook a site inspection of the proposed additions to the GRYC on the 14th of October and provided a report 8 days later. The NHC has authorised GRYC to proceed with the activities with some conditions that can be readily satisfied.

Assuming that Development Approval (Planning) is received, the next stage is to appoint an Architect and Structural Engineer to complete documentation for Development Approval (Building) and to invite tenders from suitably qualified Builders.

Financing is obviously a critical consideration. The objective is to avoid borrowing if possible. Our strategy will be developed once cost estimates are known and targets set. It might be that we can undertake the development in stages if necessary. Grants will be a particular focus. The next round of Community Recreation & Sport Facilities Program grants is open in February 2015, and other grant options will also be sort. The project timelines will be significantly affected by these processes.

Then there are all the building and construction considerations. More updates will be provided as we progress.

Wonderful Way to Wellington

Over the October long weekend, 13 yachts in three divisions competed in the first race of the DSM Landscape and Building Supplies Summer Series, the Goolwa to Wellington Race.

The Goolwa to Wellington Race is the longest race the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club conducts and takes entrants from the start in front of the GRYC along the river past Clayton and Point Sturt then across Lake Alexandrina past Narrung and Pomanda Point to the finish line.

As entrants set up their boats and readied themselves for the race the wind quickly went from a very light nor'easterly to a breezy northerly. The wind continued to build and by the time the race started at 0830hrs was gusting to 23 knots from the nor'west.

The wind persisted like this for a couple of hours and it was a quick race to Stony Point. However as yachts entered Lake Alexandrina the wind quickly abated and at times yachts were left wallowing in mill pond like conditions while their wind indicators spun aimlessly through 360 degrees. There was enough wind though to ensure everyone finished by mid afternoon.

Out on the lake the fleet split with some taking the rhumb line and others heading higher into the lake seeking a better apparent wind and boat speed. As yachts neared the finish line it appeared both strategies had worked!

Crossing the line first and hours ahead of the monohulls was The Tribe a Corsair skippered by John Hardy out of the Royal South Australian Yacht Squadron. In the spinnaker division Escapade an Elliot skippered by Craig McPhee from the Clayton Bay Boat Club finished fastest and in the non spinnaker division Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club member Peter Shipside skippered his Norwalk Island Sharpie to line honours.

After the race everyone relaxed on the lawn in front of the Wellington Hotel until results were announced and dinner beckoned up at the pub.



Club Profile: Christopher Reiffel

Chris and his adopted brother Alvyn at East Lewis Island



Chris was born forty two years ago in the small WA mining town of Dampier WA. His early years were spent in different foster homes, of which he has little or no recollection. He was finally adopted at age four in Dampier by Helen and Graham Reiffel, and he became Christopher Reiffel. His father Graham was a train driver with WA railways. With Helen and Graham, Chris experienced love, happiness and ambition. Ambition is my word, but teaching his son to sail well and being 'the very best at anything he did' became a passion for the demanding Graham Reiffel. Chris appeared somewhat uncomfortable when I told him he was obviously a good yachtsman and academically very bright. He took no credit for this, saying that if he was any good at anything it was his father Graham who made him so.

By aged six Chris was a junior member of the Hampton Harbour Boat and Sailing *Club.* There he learned to sail his Flying Ant 10 ft skiff Pie & Sauce. 'Dad was ultra competitive,' Chris says. Apparently his father would sit on the foreshore with his binoculars and record Chris's responses to wind shifts, and note how well he tacked and gibed. When they arrived home together they would analyse Chris's sailing and then examine different sailing manuals so that in Chris's father's words, 'he could learn how to sail.' On these occasions Chris was not just Graham's son he was his student. 12.5 dinghy sailing soon followed out of Hampton Harbour and given Chris's prowess he was selected for

high performance training with the likes of John Bertram as coach. He learned to fly a kite and before long was entering and winning WA state junior dinghy titles.

There are 44 islands off the Dampier coast and Graham and Helen Reiffel had a shack on the island of East Lewes where Chris spent memorable weekends and holidays. Chris's father sailed an RL 24 named Phoenix and won state and national RL 24 titles. A memorable if traumatic sail with eleven year old Chris on board occurred when Phoenix was sailing downwind three miles off the Dampier coast. With the keel up and the kite flying the yacht broached and Phoenix began sinking. No one on board was wearing life jackets. Chris and his father and two other crew members spent the next six hours treading water and holding onto the submerged gunwale of the upturned yacht. By this time they had drifted into a fishing channel and Chris was rescued by a 20 foot fishing boat. Thoroughly dehydrated the fishing boat could only offer eleven year old Chris a tin of Swan Gold!

Besides competitive sailing Chris participated in the Korean martial arts discipline of Taekwondo. Conditioning the body and sharpening the mind is the goal of this demanding discipline and the determined and focused Chris achieved at the highest with a 3rd dan black belt in the discipline. It was at this time that an unfortunate accident left him blind in his right eye. He was casually swinging a piece of electrical flex when the loose end hit his eye with copper needle like pieces entering the eye ball. This traumatic experience resulted in him being prevented from playing any more contact sports. Much ophthalmic surgery followed with Chris being the first juvenile person in WA to have a gel lens implanted so that some limited sight could return.

Never daunted Chris decided to take up competitive cycling with Graham driving his son across WA to compete in country, regional and state titles. In training Chris would cycle at least 100km a day to achieve high performance in both distance and time trial cycling. By age eighteen he was a member of the elite WA Men's Grade A road and track cycling team. However, during these teenage years an important if not principal interest for Chris was wind surfing. 'Wind surfing came to dominate my life,' he said, 'and was I having fun.' Since schools in Dampier started at 8:30am this meant that by early afternoon Chris was invariably on the beach wind surfing. As one would expect the competitive urge was such that not only did he master the sport but was soon competing and winning at country week and then WA state championships. When he entered university he earned 'beer money' as a wind surfing instructor at the Royal Perth Yacht Club.

Sometimes life in the fast and high performance lane of any endeavour suddenly can come to a halt. Chris was training for a road race when he was hit by a car. This accident resulted in a broken arm, dislocated shoulder and multiple bruising. His injuries and the trauma of somersaulting over an oncoming car were to leave their mark. Chris never competed again in cycle races.

After completing an honours degree with a major in chemistry at the University of WA Chris gained employment in the mining industry. A significant appointment was a four year stint at Mount Tom Price as a grade control engineer. Chris says that the mining industry is very tough and you soon learn never to be offended, but there were great opportunities there for him. Clearly, given his qualifications, he was in demand. After years in the west Chris moved to take up a mining environment position at the Port Pirie smelter. He was still wind surfing so whenever the opportunity occurred he would drive most weekends to wind surf at Goolwa. 'There are far too many sharks in waiting for you in Spencer Gulf to spend time windsurfing there - Goolwa was ideal.'

In Port Pirie in 2001 Chris met his wife

Shaynanne who is a history and legal studies high school teacher. When their daughter Abrielle was born, Chris, while still in part committed to the mining industry began to develop alternative employment options. At this stage he successfully completed an IT degree at RMIT, and not long after moved to work as an IT consultant for Tea Tree Gully Council where he spent the next five years. Chris, Shayanne, Abrielle (11) and son Kyden (8) moved to Birdwood in 2003. By this time Chris had an IT mining consultant position with BHP and has progressed since then to develop his own IT consultancy with a focus on the role of IT in the mining industry.

This profile started with reference to Chris's adoption. Chris maintained there was always this secret in his life which ultimately he needed to explore. Despite a full and happy family life he never felt he was a Reiffel and when his daughter was born, encouraged by Shayanne he set out to discover his biological father and mother. There was he says mixed results; but he is very glad he has made that contact and since then has come to know his biological father Steve very well. Sadly, Graham Reiffel, who on occasions has come to GRYC and sailed with son Chris on Tijuana Taxi, died earlier this year. He can be justifiably proud of Chris's commitment and many achievements, especially his recent election as GRYC Rear Commodore.

Story after story, the adjustment of lives presents stimulating and challenging decisions for a reviewer. I've been privileged to have a glimpse of Chris Reiffel's life. Whatever is written about Chris, the line of action and his many achievements is naturally superimposed on a line of feeling and his reaching for identity. Such a superimposition represents who our Rear Commodore really is. He is committed to serve GRYC and proud to be a flag officer, albeit a flag officer with distinct views about competitive sailing, especially when he's on the helm of Voodoo Child. Yet such is Chris's commitment to his sailing club and friends that he now has junior GRYC member Lachlan Wauchope on the mainsheet of Voodoo Child. Now, Chris is planning to bring his recently widowed mother Helen from Dampier to live close by with his family in Birdwood. Life has certainly come full circle for Chris Reiffel and as he says, 'I've had fun and a few challenges on the way.'

Get your entries in NOW!!!

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There are some very important changes for the 2015 race, carefully designed to improve safety for all competitors. As usual the race will start near the Milang jetty, proceed across Lake Alexandrina to Point Sturt, and then downstream to the finish line at Goolwa in front of the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club. For the 2015 race, a gate will be set approximately half way across Lake Alexandrina but within 2 NM of the shoreline and a second gate will be bounded by Channel Marker 88 and Point Sturt. All boats except those in Division 6 must pass through both gates.

There will be compulsory briefings for entrants, at Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club at 0900 hours on Saturday 24th January 2015, or at Milang at 1800 hours on Saturday 24th January or at 0800 hours on Sunday 25th January 2015.

Other changes are also included in the Notice of Race and the Sailing Instructions, which are available through the Goolwa Regatta Week website www.goolwaregattaweek.com.au.

With the warmer weather on us it is time to think about cruising and getting your yacht or power boat ready.

Whilst you will be aware that your partner and crew often request the cleaning out of all below and above decks, don't forget the important aspects:

- Have your motor serviced or at least check the plugs and oil.
- Get rid of that old fuel and purchase fresh fuel both for your tank and spare can.
- Check your VHS radio is operational and perform a radio check with a base station channel 72 for the club.
- Check that you have sufficient life jackets onboard and that they are up to date if self inflating.
- Check your flares and make sure that they are current and not out of date.
- Check your tool kit, and that all tools borrowed from home have been replaced.
- Check your fire extinguisher and get it serviced if necessary.
- Make sure you have enough fenders on board for that raft up with other members.

Remember cruising is more fun with others, so come along even on the long races and enjoy the companionship of other Club Members. Just register on race day as a Cruising participant. Catering For Summer Cruising

When guests come aboard try these Canapés which are very easy to prepare onboard and your fellow cruisers will be impressed. If you use the following recipe and tinned tuna this will not take up too much space in your esky. All this yummy food and you didn't have to light up the metho stove!!!!!!!

Recipe Smoked Tuna Crostini (makes 20 portions)

1 bag of Italian wholegrain crostini toasts

2x 125g tins John West Smoked Tuna (or Smoked Salmon) fillets in oil drained well

1/4 cup sour cream

- 1/4 cup of Paul Newman's Own Whole Egg Aioli
- 1 garlic clove (crushed)
- 2 tsp horseradish cream (add a little more if you like)
- 1 tsp grated lemon zest

Dill or thyme leaves to garnish

Lemon wedges to serve



Method:

Combine aioli, sour cream, garlic, horseradish cream and lemon zest in a bowl and add salt and pepper to your taste. Top the crostini toasts with about a teaspoon of the mixture and then the drained tuna fillets. Garnish with a little dill or thyme, serve on a platter with lemon wedges.

And open up that cold bottle of Ballastone wine to further impress.
